Travelling to the Gelendzhik Bay of the Black Sea



Summer is the time for travelling. The whole year we wait for our favourite season. People like sunshine, warm

In July my husband and I went to the South of Russia. I've already visited Gelendzhik for the third time. The name "Gelendzhik" is translated "The white bride" from the Turkic languages.

Welcome to the Urals!

Sysert

(named after the river Sysert) is situated 30 km south from the city Ekaterinburg. It spreads on steep slopes covered with coniferous forest of the deep valley of the river Sysert, and on the banks of ponds at the foot of Mt. Besenkovaya.

This mountain and Sysertskaa pond are the main sights of the local landscape - from the upper part of the mountain a spectacular panorama of the city and the river valley opens before us. Mt. Besenkovaya is the highest peak in the area. At its base the first buildings of the Sysert metallurgical factory were built. On the peak and slopes, signs of primitive men were found - among them bronze bird idols - similar to those found on the top of Mt. Azov near the town Polevskoi, arrow-heads and stone boomerangs.

The first settlement was based here in 1732, in connection with construction the metallurgical factory on the river Sysert. The raw material (iron ore) for the factory was sent from the deposit, discovered by peasants

from the village Ar-



amilskaya Sloboda in 1680. The factory's location was chosen directly by William de Gennin - an engineer and artillery general. He found this convenient place for a future factory at the confluence of the rivers Sysert and Chernaya in 1731.

For a long time Sysert was the central administrative department of the Sysert mountain district, including the following metallurgical factories - Sysertskaa, Polevskoi, Severskaa, Verkhnesysertskaa, and Iliinskii. Sysert was originally planned and built by Alexey Turchaninov (famous salt producer and merchant in the Urals) in 1779—a monument of the architecture of the 18th century.

Two notable buildings - the Church of Saint Simeon and Anne and Turchaninov's house are located in the factory square on the bank of the Sysertskaa pond, where different holidays are often celebrated.

Sysert is "washed" by lakes - Big Sysert from the south and southwest, Small Sysert and Iliinskii from the east. Big Sysert is located within the town limits and includes three gulfs: in the north, Chernovskoi (named after the river Chernaya), in the south, the longest Verkhnesysertskaa and the shortest gulf in the northeast. The river Sysert flows from the last gulf. In the lake several species of fish are found - perch, ruff, crucian, small fry, bream (freshwater) and pike. On the northern bank of the lake Mt. Bolshoi Ugor ("Big Hill") raises, and along the western bank stretches Mt. Chernovskoi Uval (named after the river Chernaya) - covered with mixed (pines, birches)



forest. Also on the northern bank is the natural monument - the rock "Sivka-Burka" (named after the hero of a Russian fairy-tale).

In the first quarter of the 19th century Sysert's metallurgical factory was one of the largest enterprises in the Urals. Sysert was known as the

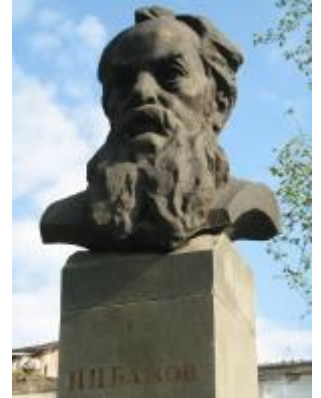
administrative centre of the rich mountain district, including Severskaa and Polevskoi metallurgical factories, tin mines, gold mines and many subsidiary manufacturing enterprises and services. Sysert's factory smelted cast iron and manufactured iron articles. At various exhibitions the factory received many awards for the excellent quality of its production, on which the brand - the image of a heron, was put.

In the beginning of the 20th century Sysert was a typical Uralian settlement - founded at the factory. Located here were schools - including the higher national school, a children's shelter with school, a small hospital, post office, telegraph office, meteorological station and some churches.

Sysert received "town status" in 1946 and it still maintains the aspect



It is worth visiting!



One of the sights in the region is *Lake Talkov Kamien* - located in a westerly direction 4 – 5 km from the town centre near Mt. Chernovskoi Uval. The lake has an artificial origin - it is an old abandoned talc mine, which was flooded by subterranean waters. Talc schist was mined here by hand in the last decades of the 19th century and was used as a fire retardant material in the metallurgical factories of the former Sysert mountain district.

The town's main tourist attraction is *Bazhov's house*. Pavel Petrovich Bazhov (1879-1950) is one of the most famous Russian writers. He is widely popular because he wrote many fairy-tales dedicated to the Urals and local craftsmen. The house holds many unique objects of Russian people daily life of the 19th and early 20th centuries. The exhibits include works made by gifted local artists and also kitchen utensils, spinning wheels, weaving loom, Russian sledges and other objects created by anonymous folk craftsmen.

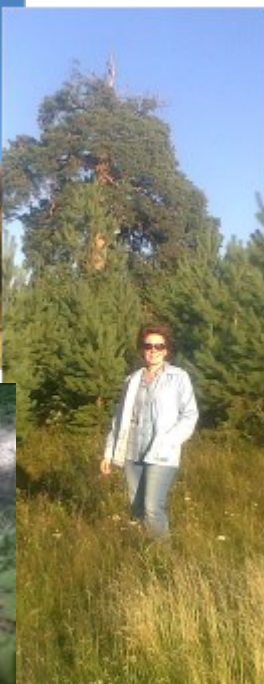
At present the enterprise produces decorative sculpture on subjects of folk fairy-tales of the Urals Russian narrative poems and ballads; tea- and coffee-sets, decorative vases. Usually the articles are decorated with underglaze



painting, but sometimes overglaze painting is applied. Soft brownish-grey and light blue tones are mostly used in painting. Ornamental concepts are often found in the landscapes of the Urals.

Collections of Sysert' artworks are represented in many museums of the Russian Federation. These articles are rewarded with diplomas of different exhibitions.

The Sysertiv Farfor"Porcelain Factory, which now produces porcelain tableware and sculpture, was founded on the basis of «Promcooperator» Guild, existed since 1942. First the Guild manufactured earthenware, but from the late 40-ies it came close to renovation of porcelain industry, which had definite traditions in Sysert' - a small porcelain manufacture existed there as far back as the late 19th - the early 20th century.

My Native Land

S a b a n t u y !



Sabantuy is a Bashkir and Tatar summer festival, that dates back to the Volga Bulgarian epoch. At first Sabantuy was a festival of farmers in rural areas, but it later became a national holiday and now is widely celebrated in the cities.

The name of the festival ("Sabantuy" in Tatar) means "plough's feast", and the festival originally marked the start of the sowing season. Today it is a general celebration of Tatar culture (and, to a lesser extent, of Chuvash and Bashkir culture as well). There are events across the region, but the largest is Kazan's, which takes place a short drive outside of the city.



Sabantuy traces its origins to the pre-Islamic epoch, when it was celebrated before the sowing seasons. The presence of Sabantuy was noticed by ibn Fadlan as early as in 921.



Traditional songs and other customs of the Sabantuy probably had a religious connotation at that time. Later, with the spread of Islam among Tatars and Bashkirs and Christianity among Chuvashes, it became a secular holiday. In each region, villages took turns to celebrate the holiday. In the beginning of the 20th century Saban-

tuy gained recognition as the national festival of the Tatars. The Soviet authorities approved of this festival probably due to its humble rural origin. However, they moved Sabantuy to the after-sowing season, thus merging it with the ancient summer festival.

The main distinctive elements of Sabantuy include the traditional sporting competitions such as *köräş* (Tatar wrestling), horse racing, race-in-sack, pillar-climbing, egg-in-spoon-in-mouth-racing, sacks-battle on the crossbar, pot smashing, finding a coin in a *qatıq* (a beverage made from sour milk), and other contests. Such activities take place on the *mäydan*, which would usually be located at the edge of a forest.



Sabantuy!

On June 12th the official celebrations for Sabantuy took place in the village of Kadnikovo not far from Yekaterinburg.

The central area of the festival was full of small stages, with various folk musicians and dancers all dressed in resplendent national costumes. It seemed as though each stage had been set up independently, and that they were all in competition with each other. Walking around, one could always hear at least two or three different sources of music, blending together into a medley of accordions and voices. In the wooded area were also a host of traditional Tatar games, with which anyone was free to join in. Some of the games were familiar, albeit with a bit of a twist: there was a sack race, but the competitors were all running in their sacks rather than jumping; there was an egg-and-spoon race, where participants had to hold the spoon in their mouth rather than hand.

Other games were completely new: there was one involved trying to walk barefoot up a long, narrow, smooth tree trunk stuck into the ground at an angle; best of all, however, was the pillow fighting that took place straddled on a log, first to fall off was the loser. Many people were taking part in games for fun rather than the prizes anyway.



The focal point of the event was the enormous main stage. Various performers of folk and pop music, both Tatar and Russian, were on the stage while various games went on around it. Most interesting to watch was kurash, traditional Tatar wrestling that was happening on the two squares in front of the stage. The games were short and usually only lasted one round: the two wrestlers locked into a sort of embrace, holding on to each other with towels, and then attempted to throw their opponent to the ground. Once one person had been thrown off his feet, the game was over and the next contestants entered the ring.

It was very interesting and fun for me and my friends to visit this celebration!

My trip was so fantastic, that I can't tell you all my emotions about my experience. I have met many interesting students from all over the

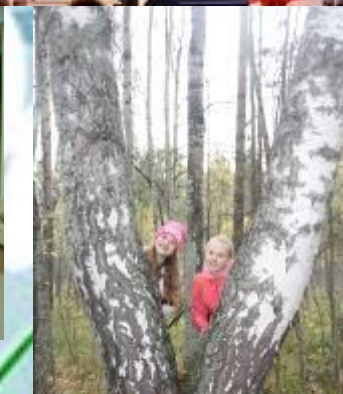

I always take a camera with me and take pictures of everything that interests me. Look at the pictures and you will see the most interesting Sysert sights and places, inside and around it.

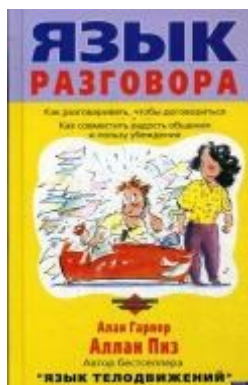

After Lewis Carroll received the money for his book, he went together with his friend Liddell on a long travel. They were in France, Germany and Russia. In Russia they visited Petersburg, Nizhniy Novgorod and Moscow. This was the only long travel made by Lewis Carroll. After that he came back to Oxford. But he did not work as a teacher of mathematics.

Why do I like this fairy-tale? There are many interesting characters, amazing events, unreal things in it. On the one hand, it is funny and picturesque fairy-tale (a rabbit with watches, very strange queen, royal garden with roses), but on the other hand, it is a philosophical fairy-tale.
